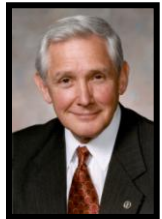
### Michael Cascone, Jr.

Michael Cascone, Jr. is the current Chairman Emeritus, former Chairman and CEO of Blue Cross Blue Shield of Florida. He served in many different roles during his 35+ year career at BCBS-Florida, including President and COO, and Executive Vice President. At the state level, Mr. Cascone served as a member of the Board of Directors of the Florida Council of 100, the Florida Chamber Board of Governors and Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Jacksonville University. He has served on the Diocesan Board for Catholic Charities, the Diocesan Stewardship Committee, as Chairman of the Executive Committee of Guardian of Dreams, past president of the Board of Jacksonville Regional Catholic Charities and as a member of the Board of Big Brothers and Big Sisters of Greater Jacksonville.



### Pamela S. Chally, PhD, RN

Dr. Pamela Chally is the Dean and Professor of the Brooks College of Health, serving the University of North Florida since 1993 as faculty member, associate dean and dean. She has published 35 articles and book chapters and presented over 100 presentations, and has received 8 teaching awards. She serves on the boards of Brooks Health System, WJCT, I.M. Sulzbacher Center, Haven Hospice, and the Center for Global Health and Medical Diplomacy. She was named one of Northeast Florida's Great 100 Nurses in 2000, an Eve Award finalist in 2004 and a Health Care Hero Super Nurse finalist in 2004. In 2006, she was honored as a "Woman of Influence" by the Jacksonville Business Journal. In 2008, she was named the Distinguished Professor at the University of North Florida and was an Eve Award winner.



### Yank D. Coble, Jr., MD

Dr. Yank Coble is the Director and Distinguished Professor of the Center for Global Health and Medical Diplomacy, University of North Florida; and Clinical Professor of Medicine, University of Florida. Dr. Coble is Past President of The World Medical Association (WMA), American Medical Association, and President Emeritus of the American College of Physicians and the American Association of Clinical Endocrinologists. Dr. Coble serves on the boards of Research!America and the Institute of Medicine Roundtable on Environmental Health Sciences, Research and Medicine. Since 2002, Dr. Coble has served on the USA and WMA Delegations to the World Health Assembly.



### T. O'Neal Douglas

T. O'Neal Douglas is the retired Chair and CEO of American Heritage Life Insurance Company and the holding company American Heritage Life Investment Corporation. He is a former trustee of the University of North Florida, a past Board member and past Chairman of Baptist Medical Center and Baptist Health System, a past Director of the Barnett Bank of Jacksonville and Nations Bank, N.A. He was also a former Chair of Florida Tax Watch, a former member of the Board of Visitors of Lenoir-Rhyne College, a past Board member and former Chair of the Jacksonville Health Education Programs, and former member of the Board of Directors of PSS World Medical. He is one of the founders of the Center for Global Health and Medical Diplomacy at the University of North Florida.



### Henry Luke

Henry Luke, is the President of Luke Planning, Inc., which provides community visioning and strategic planning services. Mr. Luke served as facilitator in the 2005 development of Duval County's *Blueprint for Prosperity* and in the 1987 development of "The Strategic Transportation Plan" for the Florida Department of Transportation. Mr. Luke has served on the Board of Reynolds, Smith and Hills, Inc., the Jacksonville Crime Commission, the Board of Healthcare Management Services, Inc., the Florida Chamber of Commerce Board of Governors, the Jacksonville Chamber of Commerce, and he has served as a Florida Chamber Foundation Trustee.



### Carleton T. Rider, MA, MPH

Carleton T. Rider is a Senior Fellow with the Center for Global Health and Medical Diplomacy, University of North Florida. In January 2008 he retired as Senior Administrator of Mayo Clinic after a career of 31 years. Previously, he served as the Administrator of Mayo Clinic Jacksonville, the Director of Winn-Dixie Stores, Inc., a member of the Mayo Clinic Board of Trustees, and Campaign Chair of the United Way of Northeast Florida. He is past Chair of the Board of Directors of the American Medical Group Association (AMGA) and current chair of the Board of the American Medical Group Foundation (AMGF). In 2006 Mr. Rider was named the Distinguished Mayo Administrator. Mr. Rider served in Viet Nam in the United States Marine Corps.



### **Cecil B. Wilson, MD - National Advisor and Fellow**

Cecil B. Wilson, MD was elected president-elect of the American Medical Association (AMA) in June 2009. He has been a member of the AMA Board of Trustees (BOT) since 2002 serving as chair from 2006-2007. Dr. Wilson has been a member of the AMA House of Delegates since 1992. Dr. Wilson has a distinguished record of service and leadership in organized medicine having served as president of the Florida Medical Association (FMA) and chair of its board of governors and executive committee; president of the Orange County Medical Society, and of the medical staffs of the Winter Park Memorial Hospital and Florida Hospital Medical Center, Orlando.

Dr. Wilson received his bachelor's degree in history and his doctorate from Emory University, Atlanta. He interned at the U.S. Naval Hospital, Portsmouth, Va., and completed his residency in internal medicine at the U.S. Naval Hospital, San Diego. He served as a Navy flight surgeon, rising to the rank of commander.

Dr. Wilson's service in organized medicine includes leadership in his specialty of internal medicine. He is past chair of the ACP Board of Regents. Prior to the merger of ACP and the American Society of Internal Medicine (ASIM), Dr. Wilson served on the board of ASIM and was a member of the merger committee, resulting in a combined organization that is the largest medical specialty society in the United States.

In addition to his work within organized medicine, Dr. Wilson is a board member of COLA, a physician-run organization that accredits more than 8,000 physician office laboratories nationwide. He is past president of the Florida Statewide Health Council and a past chair of the Local Health Council of East Central Florida.

Dr. Wilson has been in private practice of internal medicine in Central Florida for 30 years. He is board-certified in internal medicine and a Master of the American College of Physicians (ACP). He serves as National Advisor and Fellow for the Center for Global Health and Medical Diplomacy in Jacksonville, FL.



### **Otmar Kloiber, MD – International Advisor and Fellow**

Dr. Kloiber studied in medicine at the University of Cologne from 1974 until 1985. From 1985 through 1986 he was a Postdoctoral fellow at the University of Minnesota, Duluth, USA, Department of Biochemistry, neurotoxicology and cerebral substance transport. In 1986 he became a research assistant at the Max-Planck-Institute for Neurological Research, Cologne in pathophysiological studies on brain energy metabolism and cerebral blood flow.

From 1991 until 1997 he was a foreign relations adviser at the German Medical Association (Federation of the State Chambers of Physicians); maintaining international and bilateral contacts and co-operations in European and international bodies, international and foreign health policy, co-operation with central and east European organizations and administrations, support for health and social policy reforms, construction of the German Health Network.

Also in 1991 he worked in co-operation with the Standing Committee of European Doctors (CPME), the World Medical Association (WMA), the international conference of medical chambers (CIO), the European Forum of Medical Associations and WHO, and with other national medical associations in the development of deontology under the influence of health system organization and its relation to the provision of medical services.

Dr. Kloiber was Secretary of the German Medical Association from 1997 until 2002 and also was a member of the Study Commission on the Law and Ethics of Modern Medicine of the German Bundestag (Parliament), 14th electoral term. From 2002 through 2005 Dr. Kloiber was Deputy Secretary General of the GMA. In 2005 he became Secretary General of the World Medical Association and remains in that position currently.
