### **Project Goals**

#### ***ATOD Prevention***

By June 30, 2005, to decrease by 50% the percentage of students in grades 6-12, in participating NEFEC districts, who report current use of alcohol (past 30 days), as measured by the Florida Youth Substance Abuse Survey (FYSAS). Baseline statistics from the 2000 FYSAS were 33.7% (Baker), 28.8% (Bradford), 38.2% (Dixie), 35.6% (Flagler), 38.9% (Gilchrist), 13.8% (Lafayette\*), 34.5% (Levy), 31.9% (Nassau), 15.2% (P. K. Yonge\*), and 29.5% (Union).

By June 30, 2005, to increase by 2.5 years the mean age of first use of alcohol among students in grades 6-12, in participating NEFEC districts, as measured by the FYSAS. Baseline statistics from the 2000 FYSAS were 12.6 years (Baker), 12.6 years (Bradford), 12.6 years (Dixie), 11.7 years (Flagler), 12.3 years (Gilchrist), 12.3 years (Levy), 12.0 years (Nassau), and 12.6 years (Union).

By June 30, 2005, to decrease by 50% the percentage of students in grades 6-12, in participating NEFEC districts, who report current use of cigarettes (past 30 days), as measured by the FYSAS. Baseline statistics from the 2000 FYSAS were 18.9% (Baker), 17.1% (Bradford), 23.4% (Dixie), 15.1% (Flagler), 31.2% (Gilchrist), 12.4% (Lafayette\*), 23.2% (Levy), 20.8% (Nassau), 2.2% (P. K. Yonge\*), and 19.8% (Union).

By June 30, 2005, to decrease by 50% the percentage of students in grades 6-12, in participating NEFEC districts, who report current use of smokeless tobacco (past 30 days), as measured by the FYSAS. Baseline statistics from the 2000 FYSAS were 12.2% (Baker), 11.3% (Bradford), 19.1% (Dixie), 12.6% (Flagler), 18.5% (Gilchrist), 4.3% (Lafayette\*), 13.3% (Levy), 15.6% (Nassau), 1.7% (P. K. Yonge\*), and 17.0% (Union).

By June 30, 2005, to increase by 2.5 years the mean age of first use of tobacco among students in grades 6-12, in participating NEFEC districts, as measured by the FYSAS. Baseline statistics from the 2000 FYSAS were 12.3 years (Baker), 12.0 years (Bradford), 11.9 years (Dixie), 11.7 years (Flagler), 11.9 years (Gilchrist), 11.8 years (Levy), 11.6 years (Nassau), and 12.0 years (Union).

By June 30, 2005, to decrease by 50% the percentage of students in grades 6-12, in participating NEFEC districts, who report current use of marijuana (past 30 days), as measured by the FYSAS. Baseline statistics from the 2000 FYSAS were 11.3% (Baker), 14.9% (Bradford), 18.4% (Dixie), 15.6% (Flagler), 21.4% (Gilchrist), 0.5% (Lafayette\*), 16.5% (Levy), 12.8% (Nassau), 2.2% (P. K. Yonge\*), and 9.5% (Union).

By June 30, 2005, to increase by 2.5 years the mean age of first use of marijuana among students in grades 6-12, in participating NEFEC districts, as measured by the FYSAS. Baseline statistics from the 2000 FYSAS were 13.6 years (Baker), 13.4 years (Bradford), 13.3 years (Dixie), 13.6 years (Flagler), 13.1 years (Gilchrist), 13.1 years (Levy), 13.5 years (Nassau), and 13.7 years (Union).

By June 30, 2005, to decrease by 50% the percentage of students in grades 6-12, in participating NEFEC districts, who report current use of any illicit drug excluding marijuana (past 30 days), as measured by the

FYSAS. Baseline statistics from the 2000 FYSAS were 7.0% (Baker), 7.4% (Bradford), 7.1% (Dixie), 10.1% (Flagler), 14.8% (Gilchrist), 10.1% (Levy), 9.8% (Nassau), and 6.6% (Union).

### ***Violence Prevention***

By June 30, 2005, to decrease by 20% the number of fighting incidents per 1000 for students, grades PK-12, as measured by the 2003-2004 SESIR Florida School Indicators Report. According to the 2000-2001 SESIR Report, the number of fighting incidents per 1000 for students, grades PK-12 was 18.72 (Baker), .23 (Bradford), 39.14 (Dixie), .84 (Flagler), .35 (Gilchrist), 73.15 (Lafayette), 20.14 (Levy), 19.98 (Nassau), 4 (PK Yonge), 48 (Union).

By June 30, 2005, to decrease by 20% the number of battery incidents per 1000 for students, grades PK-12, as measured by the 2003-2004 SESIR Florida School Indicators Report. According to the 2000-2001 SESIR Report, the number of battery incidents per 1000 for students, grades PK-12 was 9.16 (Baker), .47 (Bradford), .98 (Flagler), .69 (Gilchrist), 11.51 (Levy), .27 (Nassau), 2.11 (Union).

By June 30, 2005, to decrease by 20% the percentage of students in grades 6-12, who reported attacking someone with intent to harm (past 12 months), as measured by the Florida Youth Substance Abuse Survey (FYSAS). Baseline statistics from the 2000 FYSAS were 10.6% (Baker), 14.6% (Bradford), 19.5% (Dixie), 16.6% (Flagler), 18.8% (Gilchrist), 21.8% (Levy), 17.0% (Nassau), and 14.4% (Union).

By June 30, 2005, to decrease by 20% the number of weapons possession incidents per 1000 for students, grades PK-12, as measured by the 2003-2004 SESIR data. According to the 2000-2001 SESIR data, the number of weapons possession incidents per 1000 for students, grades PK-12 was 1.22 (Baker), .23 (Bradford), .2.06 (Dixie), .98 (Flagler), 1.04 (Gilchrist), 1.72 (Lafayette), 1.67 (Levy), 1 (PK Yonge), .09 (Nassau).

\* Baseline statistics for Lafayette County and the P. K. Yonge Lab School come from the 1999-2000 NEFEC Drug Survey.
