



# Citation Guide - APA, MLA, & Turabian Bibliography Styles

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The following examples are based on the rules listed in the current editions of the APA, MLA, and Turabian style manuals for writers. This quick reference guide is not intended to replace or to be a substitute for the following complete style manuals:

## Formatting Notes:

- Use a "hanging indent" to show the beginning of a citation. In other words, the first line of the citation begins at the left margin. Subsequent lines are indented ½ inch from the left margin (typically 5 spaces).
- Double-space all entries in the reference list for APA and MLA. Turabian uses single spacing. (This guide does not double-space the entries in order to save space.)
- APA, MLA, and Turabian use italicized type to indicate titles of major works (book titles, journal titles, etc.).
- With its latest edition of the Handbook, MLA has dropped the requirement for including the URL for materials retrieved online. MLA's current advice is to include the URL only if the source might be difficult to find again or if it is required by a particular professor.
- Turabian examples given are for the bibliography, not for the notes. Refer to the full style manual for more help on notes and parenthetical references.

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## BOOKS

The basic format for a book citation requires listing the author's name, the title of the book, the place of publication, the publisher's name, and the date of publication. Edited books, when cited in full, will list the editor's name instead of an author's name.

### BOOK – ONE AUTHOR

The example used is a book written by the author Fifi LaRue, entitled *My Fabulous Life: Parisian Flings and Other Things*, and published in Paris, France, by the publisher LaPlume in 1992. Note that APA capitalizes only the first word of the title and the first word of the subtitle, while MLA and Turabian capitalize all significant title words.

### **BOOK – TWO AUTHORS**

The example used is a book written by the authors Terrie A. Dactyl and Braun T. Saurus, entitled *The Jury's Still Out on Jurassic Park*, and published in Raptor, Pennsylvania, by Altamira Press in 1994. While APA only capitalizes the first word of the title, proper nouns within a title should also be capitalized.

### **BOOK WITH AN EDITOR**

The example used is a book edited by Teresa Mae Anklet, entitled *Big Bruisers*, and published in Montreal, Canada, by Strange Brew Press, 1976. Edited books normally are collections of essays or chapters written by a variety of authors. The editor is responsible for collecting and arranging the contents of the book and might also contribute to the book's content.

### **BOOK REVIEW**

The example used is a review written by Francois Snodgrass in the journal *Parisian Personnae*. The book being reviewed is by Fifi LaRue and is entitled *My Fabulous Life: Parisian Flings and Other Things*. Snodgrass's review was published in 2007, in volume 37, issue number 2, of the journal, on page 132. Turabian recommends citing reviews only in the notes unless the review is key to an argument set forth in a paper or frequently cited elsewhere. The Turabian example listed below is for the bibliography.

## **ELECTRONIC BOOK**

The example used is a book by Emma Sue Goose, entitled *Letter to Little Boy Blue: You Can Never Go Home Again*, published in Berlin, Germany, by Fairy Tale Press in 1999. The book is electronically reproduced in *NetLibrary*, which is available to researchers through the Thomas G. Carpenter Library at UNF. The book was accessed on October 28, 2001.

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## **GOVERNMENT PUBLICATIONS**

*Citation requirements for government publications are similar to those for books. When citing a government publication provide the author's names (this might sometimes be a department or agency name), the title of the publication, the place where the document was published, the publishing department or agency, and the date of publication. Many documents issued by the Federal Government are published in Washington, DC, by the United States Government Printing Office. This is often shortened to USGPO or simply GPO.*

### **GOVERNMENT PUBLICATION – AGENCY OR DEPARTMENT REPORT**

The following is a published report of the United States Government's Department of Waste Control that was issued in 1994. The title of this 5,000 page report was *Eliminating Paper Waste in Offices of the Federal Government*. The report, which was numbered USDWC Publication No. 94-345698A, was published in Washington by the U. S. Government Printing Office.

## GOVERNMENT PUBLICATION – ONLINE

The following report issued by the National Park Service of the Federal Government was made available at the agency's website and was last updated in 2002. The report was entitled *Decorating the White House: Tips from Dolly Madison and Other First Ladies*, and was retrieved on March 22, 2008.

## GOVERNMENT PUBLICATIONS – HEARINGS

The following example represents a hearing held before the congressional committee designated as the Joint Committee on the Establishment of Prisons for Corporate Criminals. The hearing was held during the first session of the 108<sup>th</sup> Congress from October 14 - October 16, 2002.

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## INTERNET DOCUMENTS

*The basic information needed for Web pages doesn't differ greatly from the type of information needed to document print sources. When possible, identify an author for the site. This might sometimes be an organization or it might be an individual. When a site identifies no author, treat the website just as you would an anonymous article: lead off the citation with the title rather than with the author. Not all websites identify when they were last updated. If a date is not given, use the abbreviation (n.d.) to indicate that the site was undated. Where possible, identify a sponsoring organization and include the organization's name as part of the citation. If it is difficult to clearly identify responsibility for the information provided, use a fair amount of skepticism about its reliability and look for another source that is more clearly documented.*

## INTERNET DOCUMENT – ENTIRE WEBSITE

When citing an entire website, include the overall title of the site, the name of the organization or individual who maintains the website, the date the site was last updated, the date that the site was visited, and the URL (Internet address) for the site. The following example is based on the website for the television network

MTV. Identifying information on the site includes the site name (*MTV.com*), the sponsoring organization (MTV Networks), the latest update (9/03/08), the URL (<http://www.mtv.com>), and the date the site was visited.

#### **INTERNET DOCUMENT – PERSONAL HOMEPAGE**

The example is based on Fifi LaRue’s homepage on the Internet. The site does not have a special title and does not carry a date on the opening page. The site was visited on September 1, 2008.

#### **INTERNET DOCUMENT – CHAPTER OR SECTION OF A WEB SITE**

The example is based on section 3 of the website *Web Research Topics and Currents*, entitled “Electronic Chat Rooms as Support Groups.” The section was authored by Uber R. Cerfine and was updated in 2007. The site is hosted by UnReal University’s Department of Chatology and was retrieved on August 12, 2008.

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## JOURNAL ARTICLES

The basic format for an article from a journal requires the author's name, the article title, the name of the journal, the date of the article, and the volume, issue number, and inclusive page numbers. Not all journals use issue numbers. APA recommends providing both volume and issue number if each issue of the journal paginates separately, that is, if each issue begins with page 1. Turabian suggests that more is better – if the journal provides both volume and issue numbers, include them both in the citation.

### JOURNAL ARTICLE WITH VOLUME – ONE AUTHOR

The example used is an article by author Truly Learned, entitled “The Web-Toed Bibliosaurus: Cranial Measurements Indicate a Smarter Than Average Lizard,” published in volume 85 of the *Journal of the Paleocranial Society* in 1995 on pages 566-592. The journal does not paginate each issue separately, but numbers continuously over the entire volume.

### JOURNAL ARTICLE WITH VOLUME & NUMBER – MULTIPLE AUTHORS

The example used is an article by authors Adam Bisantz and Bea Biserk entitled “Adaptivity and Genetic Predisposition to Temper Tantrums.” The article was published in 2000 in volume 35, issue number 3, of the journal *Misbehavior and Medication* on pages 34-48. Each issue of the journal has its own pagination beginning with page 1.

### JOURNAL ARTICLE WITH VOLUME & NUMBER – FOUR OR MORE AUTHORS

The example used is an article authored by Otto Nomick, Rhea Flecks, Kaye Tschin, Nye Dzherk, and Nobbie Knease, entitled “Reaction Times in White Mice Which have Been Administered Large Doses of MSG.” The article was published in 1998 in volume 33, issue number 1, of the *Journal of Reflexology & Reactivity*, on pages 22-43. Each issue of the journal has its own pagination. APA requires listing all authors up to seven. For references with more than seven authors, give the first seven authors, followed by an

ellipsis, and followed by the last author. (Example: Adams, B., Brown, C., Cook, D., Davis, E., Edge, F., Francis, G., Green, H., ... Zabriskie, A. ) Turabian bibliography style calls for listing all the authors, regardless of how many.

#### **JOURNAL ARTICLE – ELECTRONICALLY PUBLISHED JOURNAL (No DOI listed)**

This example is based on an article published in an online journal. The article, written by author C.B. Cybernaught, is entitled "Hyper Over Hypertext" and was published online in volume 39, issue number 4, April 1995, in the electronic journal *World Wide Wanderer*. The article is not paginated and was retrieved on 25 May 2008.

#### **JOURNAL ARTICLE – ELECTRONICALLY PUBLISHED JOURNAL (DOI listed)**

This example is based on an article published in an online journal that assigns DOIs (Digital Object Identifiers) to each of its articles. Most publishers are now assigning DOIs to make it easier to link back to electronically published articles. The article, written by author Cosette Cremedelacreme, is entitled "An Examination of Gastronomic Imagery in the Later Poetry of Fifi LaRue. The article was published in 2008 in volume 13, issue number 2, on pages 23-43 of the journal *Poetry Parisienne*. The URL for the article is [http://www.parisienne.com/13\\_2/cremedelacreme.html](http://www.parisienne.com/13_2/cremedelacreme.html). The DOI for the article is 29.1027/00013-2893.13.2.23. The article was retrieved June 13, 2008. *Note: APA recommends using both volume and issue numbers for all electronic journal articles when both are available, regardless of pagination.*

#### **JOURNAL ARTICLE FROM AN ONLINE FULL-TEXT DATABASE (No DOI or Journal URL listed)**

The example is based on the 2007 article "Entanglements in Wonderland: Children's Stories and Their Underlying Adult Themes," by author Silvester Stiltskin. The article was published in the journal *Studies in Children's Fiction* in the March 2007 issue, volume 37, number 3, on pages 123-145. The journal has no online equivalent but it has been reproduced electronically in the online literature database *LION – Literature Online*. The database is available at the Thomas G. Carpenter Library at UNF and was retrieved on August 28, 2008. *Note: APA advises that it is generally not necessary to provide retrieval information for journal articles pulled from databases, since coverage in the database might change. When no DOI or website is available, the citation will take the format of the print journal article.*

#### **JOURNAL ARTICLE FROM AN ONLINE FULL-TEXT DATABASE (Journal URL listed)**

The example is based on the 2006 article authored by Rubio Buttons entitled "Send in the Clowns: Political Misadventures of 21<sup>st</sup> Century America." The article was published in volume 3, issue number 2, of the journal *Political Profundity* on pages 47-62. The journal also maintains electronic copies of the articles and provides the URL on the article title page (<http://www.polprof.com/2006/buttons.html>). The article is available in the database *PoliSci Online* and was retrieved from the database on September 3, 2008.

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## MAGAZINE ARTICLES

The basic format for citing a magazine article is similar to the journal format. Required information includes author's name, article title, name of the magazine, date of issue, and inclusive page numbers. Some magazines may include volume numbers. None of the three styles require those for magazines citations. Turabian recommends against citing page numbers for magazine articles since article pagination is often not continuous.

### MAGAZINE ARTICLE – ONE AUTHOR

The example is based on an article published in the magazine *Food Talk*. The article, "Blue Green Algae – It's a Main Course, It's a Shampoo, It's a Floor Wax – What Is This Stuff Anyway?" was written by author Mack Roe Biotek and was published in the September 28, 1992, issue of the magazine on pages 27-32.

### MAGAZINE ARTICLE FROM ONLINE FULL-TEXT DATABASE

The example is an article published by author Almonda Chickpea in the magazine *Nutrition Around Us* entitled "Original Tofu Recipes With a Bit of a Kick." The article appeared on pages 43-52 of the April 15, 2008, issue of the magazine. It was retrieved from the online database *FoodSearch Online* on August 18, 2008. The magazine is not available on the Internet and the article has not been assigned a DOI. *Note: APA advises that it is generally not necessary to provide retrieval information for journal articles pulled from databases, since coverage in the database might change. When no DOI or website is available, the citation will take the format of the print journal article.*

### MAGAZINE ARTICLE FROM AN ONLINE MAGAZINE (No Print Equivalent)

The example is based on an article published in the online magazine *Mock Turtle Review* in volume 13 of the magazine, the Fall 2008 issue. The article, written by author Andre Doormouse, was entitled "Off With Her Head – Alice's Adventures with the Red Queen." The magazine has no print equivalent. The article was

retrieved from the magazine's website on September 15, 2008.

Turabian recommends citing newspaper articles only in the notes unless the article is critical to an argument or is frequently cited. The following bibliography entries assume that the sample articles are critical. Turabian also recommends against citing page numbers since newspapers are often issued in multiple editions and page numbering may vary from one edition to another.*

### NEWSPAPER ARTICLE – NO AUTHOR LISTED

The example is based on an article published in the *Block and Tackle Times*, on October 31, 1995, in Section A, on pages 1 and 5. The article was entitled "Congress Votes to Cut Subsidies to Earthworm Ranchers: Sport Fishermen Squirm Over the Loss of Cheap Worms." No author was listed for the article.

*For other types of materials used in the preparation of a manuscript or research paper, follow the spirit of the*

documentation requirements demonstrated above. Always try to identify authorship, whether the author is a single individual, multiple individuals, or a corporate body. Always carefully document the title of the publication, whether it is in print or online. And always try to identify the publishing information, which normally will include the place of publication, the name of the publisher, and the date of publication. The amount of information available will vary depending on the type of publication and the means of publication.

### COMPANY ANNUAL REPORT

The example is based on the annual report from the company Shockrock Enterprises, an entertainment firm based in Rockland, Vermont. The report was printed by the company in 2008. The company, itself, is the author of the report. No individual authors are cited.

Papers filed with the ERIC system (Educational Resources Information Center) are referenced much like books. Required information includes author's name, title, date, place of production, sponsoring institution, and date. Additionally, include the ERIC Document Reproduction service number (ED number). The example is a paper filed with ERIC entitled *Mon Ma, Son Sa, Ton Ta: Accelerating French Learning in the Classroom*. It was authored by Pierre Poupon and was produced in 1999 under the auspices of the LaPlume Institute in Paris, France.

**APA** APA recommends citing interviews only in the body of the paper rather than in the reference list. This applies also to letters, memos, telephone conversations, and other similar communications. Use either of the following formats in the body of the paper:

## INTERVIEW, PUBLISHED

The example is based on an interview with sociologist Elian Nayzhun that was published in the magazine *Magnetic Personalities: the Magazine of Popular Culture* on pages 25-35 of the October 23, 2007, issue. The interview was entitled "Where I'm From: an Interview with Elian Nayzhun." Treat interviews no

differently than articles from newspapers, magazines, and journals. If clarification is needed in the APA reference, follow the title of the interview with a bracketed description (Example: [Interview]). If it is important to reference the person conducting the interview in the research, the interviewer can be listed as well.

#### **LAW CASE – PRINT**

Recommendation: Court cases are typically referenced according to the Standard System of American Legal Citation style. Citations typically reference the parties in a case, the volume, abbreviation, and page reference for the legal reporter where the case was reported, the date of the case, and, in some instances, parallel citations to the case. The standard reference for determining correct formats and abbreviations is the *Bluebook: A Uniform System of Citation*, published by the Harvard Law Review Association.

The example is based on a case reported in the *Federal Reporter*, 2d series, at page 442. The case was between Paul H. Robinson and the State of New Jersey and was decided in 1986.

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## In Text References, APA & MLA

Both APA and MLA cite sources within a paper by using parenthetical, in-text references. MLA uses the author's last name and the page number as reference. APA uses the author's last name and the year of publication. If a direct quote is used, APA requires author's name, year, and page number.

The examples below are based on an excerpt from page 39 of French author Fifi LaRue's autobiography, *My Fabulous Life*, which was published in 1969.

Excerpt:

Paris in 1920 was simply exquisite! I embarked on my writing career that year and began building my reputation for letters among the Paris intelligentsia. Oooh la la! Fifi loved Paris and Paris loved her back, passionately and with wild abandon. I fondly remember 1920 as "L'année Merveilleuse de Fifi."
