Report of Outreach Service-Learning Project Spring 2006

American Red Cross Mrs. Connelly, Dr. Kruger

Disaster Services Group established an American Red Cross Club on the UNF Campus. The club has approximately 39 members and four officers. By laws were written, policies and procedures established, and two orientation were held at UNF for new members. They are raising awareness of the Measles risk and plan a fundraiser to support prevention in developing countries, a fall blood drive, and disaster preparedness training for UNF resident students.

Health and Safety Group organized and held a blood drive at UNF in spring and collected 43 units of blood before time and supplies ran out. The group drafted Standard Operating Procedures for organizing and conducting a Blood Drive on a College Campus. An IRB was obtained and a survey was conducted with over 100 UNF students asking about barrier to blood donation. Faculty, students and Red Cross partners plan to collaborate on a publication.

Nursing Services Group drafted Standard Operating Procedures for the nurses staffing shelters which were adopted by the Red Cross. They sponsored an open-house and recruited 10 nurses from the community to volunteer as shelter staff. Several obstacles were identified to the recruitment of nurses to volunteer.

Beaches Agencies Dr. Olinzock, Mrs. Wagner

Jacksonville Beach Senior Activity Center & Neptune Beach Senior Activity Center provides beginning nursing students an opportunity to participate in intergenerational social activities with the seniors and present short health education seminars. An exercise program to promote mobility has been developed by senior nursing students for the *Jacksonville Beach Center*.

Boys and Girls Club provides students with an opportunity to mentor and tutor children and appreciate the connection among environmental and social contexts, education, and health. UNF students will help implement a City of Jacksonville funded homework program in the fall.

We Care Clinic at Mission House exposes students to a homeless and medically underserved population.

US Women and Girls Initiative is adapting a seminar on Metabolic Syndrome developed by Barbara Fletcher, and presenting it to groups in the beaches community.

Northeast Florida Area Health Education Center & Fun 2B Fit & Nassau Agencies

Dr. Meires, Dr. Kruger, Mrs. Hoff

The *Fun 2 B Fit* program is based on evidence from best practices and teaches 500 3rd grade children each year to be “fit” for life through twelve, forty-five minute classrooms sessions. Lessons promote cardiovascular risk reduction, nutrition, and exercise. Students also provide school lunch time role modeling, assist with fit field days, and design parent newsletters. Student projects relate to implementation, evaluation, and program refinement. In addition, faculty and students are helping to develop *Fit Families*, a sister program designed to help families become more active, fit, and consume healthier diets to reduce risk factors for heart disease, diabetes mellitus and stroke. During the summer, when elementary school is not in session, students are placed with the 1) Jane Adams House, an Assisted Care Living Facility and dementia unit or the 2) Barnabus Center to assist with an low income/free clinic called the Good Samaritan Clinic, both in Fernandina Beach.

Jacksonville Children’s Commission Home base

Contributions that nursing students have made to the JCC include:

Initial agency engagement and partnership development

Produced a student orientation manual to the agency and it’s multiple departments, expectations

Identified and categorized parent education materials related to pre-school screening for staff

Revised developmental activity sheets for parents and child care teachers

Scored developmental screening tests

Drafted a brochure on developmental screening for use with parent, teachers, and agencies

Developed a database to track child demographic indicators, screening scores, and place of residence

Researched and implemented a computerized, evidence-based standardized system to assist early

learning center developmental screeners to generate individualized developmental care plans for parents and daycare center staff

Assisted with implementation and evaluation of an obesity prevention program for pre-school children, including helping the nutritionist to develop teaching materials

Worked with staff from the *Healthy Families* to support positive parenting practices

Pine Forest Neighborhood Dr. Roush, Mrs. Elliott

Team-Up at Pine Forest Elementary School: Students implemented a 911 Preparedness Program for Kindergarten, 1st, 2nd, and 3rd grade students which was a wild success with the participants.

Team-Up at Henry T. Jones Community Center: In collaboration with the Center director (Pam Williams) students developed and implemented an interactive educational program for the adolescents promoting multicultural awareness. They offered an informational session, often

with games and art activities of a particular culture, on Tuesday afternoon. For the students who participated on Tuesday, a cooking lesson with food related to that culture was held on Thursday. As the program progressed, participation numbers increased and they were able to gain the trust and interest of these students. Pam taught our students about culturally appropriate activities to plan and helped students develop realistic expectations. She also supported the cooking classes with funds from her budget. Senior students lead this activity and directed two junior level semester groups.

Asthma Education at Pine Forest Elementary School: A group of 3rd and 4th semester students worked with Sherry Cheshire of the American Lung Association (ALA) and were trained to present an “Asthma 101” program to the elementary school teachers. About 15 teachers attended the one-hour session and evaluations were very positive.

Housing Partnership of Northeast Florida: Students worked with Carrie Davis, a local resident, advocate, and our main spokesperson for the neighborhood, to implement a grant focused on cultural competence education to connect staff with the multicultural, multilingual (immigrant) residents of the Sable Palms apartments. Students conducted a census of residents at Sable Palms and developed a health and social services resource booklet translated into 3 languages (Bosnian, Spanish, Vietnamese). A second group of students focused on lead poisoning prevention education in multiple languages and conducted lead screening in collaboration with the health department.

Pine Forest Family Festival: is an annual spring social, recreational, and educational event in this

community. Students at all levels participated in the planning and implementation of this festival under the guidance of Carrie Davis from the Housing Partnership of Northeast Florida and Winona Coleman from the Parks and Recreation Department. They attended weekly planning sessions and promoted the focus on cultural diversity included in a Global Village and in music and other promotions at the fest. Through the support of St. Vincent’s Community Service program, students were trained in blood cholesterol screening and received supplies and equipment loan. During the fair, their table offering blood pressure, cholesterol and glucose screening was well-attended. Other students developed an educational brochure reviewing information about hypertension, stroke and diabetes. Displays and food in the Global

Village highlighted 5 different cultures.

American Heart Association: Students implemented a stroke risk factor screening and education

intervention program, “Power to End Stroke Campaign” with elders in Pine Forest Heights and women in Sable Palms Apts. This project built on data collected by a prior group of fall students who conducted blood pressure screenings in the community. This program was well received and has been requested on many occasions in Pine Forest. Students also work with other Pine Forest Neighborhood Partners such as: the Pine Forest Heights Neighborhood Association, Healthy Start Program for pregnant women, Community Connections at Sable Palms, Women’s Center at Sable Palms and Renewed Life Ministries Church. Faculty strive to capitalize on the diversity of Pine Forest by working with partners to improve the health of this community, while giving our students a rich and rewarding learning experience.

North Riverside Agencies Mr. Ahrens, Dr. McMarlin

Metro Kids Konnection (MKK), a faith-based ministry, is located in the “commons” at Cleveland Arms apartments, a 200-unit federally, subsidized housing project. Single mothers and their children occupy all but four of the units. Students participate in after-school tutoring and one-to-one mentoring with children. A spring student group accompanied children from MKK to a community Children’s Fair and arranged sponsorship for lime green t-shirts which the children helped autograph. The MKK children and their UNF nursing students created esprit de corps and a favorable impression at the fair with their shirts. A second group of students initiated a General Education Development (GED) program with a few women in the Cleveland Arms complex. Senior students transitioned this project to the next group of students to continue.

City Rescue Mission (CRM) has served the homeless and needy in Northeast Florida since 1946 providing food and overnight shelter and emergency services at their New Life Inn downtown. CRM’s Life Builders Program is a 12-step faith-based long-term residential recovery program that typically requires twelve - eighteen months to complete. Student help serve food, work in the medical clinic, tutor in the learning center, and assist with community project and participate in events such as the annual Bed Race. Various levels of 44 nursing students, working under the leadership of senior students, organized and implemented a spring neighborhood Children’s Fair on Saturday, 9 April, 10:00 – 2:00 p.m. Over 200 inner city children attended the free fair and enjoyed the many prizes, face painting, games, jugglers, and clowns—with an educational focus on health. Nursing students arranged for park space, security, food, dental kits, nutrition education, a moonwalk, Stranger Danger, a fire truck, Teen Challenge, and UNF basketball players. Many partners also participated including the Duval County AIDS which conducted AIDS and STD screening for visitors. The CRM administrators provided guidance to the students.

Magnolia Project is a special federal Healthy Start initiative that addresses high rates of infant mortality in Duval County’s black community. The unique program focuses on improving the health of mothers prior to and between pregnancies. The Magnolia Project Community Council, made up of residents from the project area, provides community input to the project. One RN to BSN student worked with healthy Start nurses, made home visits, and built on her training as hospice nurse to develop a screening tool for use by staff nurses when they visit a mother who has experience the death of her baby.

Citizen’s Planning Advisory Committee (CPAC) 5; Northwest is a City of Jacksonville Neighborhood Initiative to put communities in touch with City Hall. Nursing students regularly attend CPAC 5 meetings and many students participated in the “Rally Reader’s program. This program consisted of reading to small groups of elementary school students for one hour prior to the CPAC meeting; and supports Mayor Peyton’s literacy initiative. All students received letters of appreciation from the Chair of CPAC

Persons w/ Special Needs

Dr. Kruger, Mrs. Hoff, Dr. Radjenovic, Mrs. Comeaux

Agency for Persons with Disabilities, explored method to implement age-appropriate health screening among persons with disabilities. Used social marketing with physicians, group home staff, and the Agency for Persons with Disabilities staff to determine product (screening form),

channel (who / where it is complete) best promotion (how to sell) and costs to lower (i.e. must train and support). Form and process is being implemented across NE FL.

UF Homeless Children's Clinic STD Prevention – assessed health promotion needs among four area homeless shelters, reviewed STD curricula, designed, implemented, and evaluated information sessions.

UF Homeless Children's Clinic collaborated with a UF MPH student and Dr. Winterbauer (UNF Anthropology-Sociology & Duval Health Department) to design a health database for children who are homeless / transient as a way to promote continuity of care. They identified health measures to extract from medical records, integrated a lit review, and collaborated on a **refereed poster accepted** for presentation at the American Public Health Association Annual Conference in Boston this fall.

Children's Medical Services SHOTS - assessed provider use of state-wide computerized SHOTS immunization tracking software and used a social marketing approach to determine best method to promote this program among primary care providers.

Children's Medical Services – UF Andrew Robinson Clinic, Care Coordination – assessed role of care coordinator, learned to navigate the system, interacted with families, identified orientation and continuing education needs and drafted prototype for a training manual. Having students act as “new hires” is allowing this agency to develop a more relevant mentoring and orientation system.

We once again were still able to serve our K-12 teachers in the 16 counties of our region via the internet, workshops, seminars and individual teacher training. The Assistant Director, Mollie Lawrence and I continue to spend an inordinate amount of time garnering small grants and donations to offset the costs of running the center. Without the continuing support of the college we would have to cut back our out reach significantly.

The following grants and monies were secured to help fund the Center activities and for the salary of the Assistant Director during the academic year 2005-2006.

- ❖ Completion of a previously awarded \$ 1,000 grant from the National Council on Economic Education (NCEE) for Financial Fitness for Life for grade 3-5 and 6-8 teachers
- ❖ Receipt of a \$ 2,500 grant from the National Council on Economic Education (NCEE) for teacher training of grade 3-5 teachers in Mathematics and Economics, Connections for Life
- ❖ Receipt of \$ 6,100 from a special program funded by the United States Department of Education and Economics International (international program of NCEE) for the Host Study Tour, bringing two economists from Belarus to UNF in February and early March
- ❖ Approximately \$ 17,000 from the *Coggin College of Business* toward the Assistant Director's salary.
- ❖ University E&G support in the amount of \$ 10,285 toward the Assistant Director's 9-month salary.

Out Reach

- ❖ Scheduled workshops at schools, specific and directed help for new teachers of economics and workshops for the Stock Market Game, as well as academic content for economics and geography throughout the year.
- ❖ Attendance at a board meeting for the Florida Council on Economic Education in January, 2006 by both the Center Director and Asst. Director in the hopes of reestablishing cooperation between University Centers and the Florida Council on Economic Education
- ❖ Provided specialized workshops in classes for professors in education at the University of North Florida for elementary teachers/pre-teachers K-5, and secondary teachers/pre-teachers (grades 6-12) in the College of Education and Human Services. Each of the sessions involved linking economics to Florida Sunshine Standards, decision making models, lessons and activities appropriate to the levels pre-teachers in the classes would be demonstrating in the future and reinforcement of the economic way of thinking conducted by the Asst. Director
- ❖ Provided pre-planning workshop training incorporating the Capstone and Virtual Economics , Economics in Action, Focus: High School Economics Normed materials for full time teachers of economics at the

high school levels as well as Best Practice Ideas for Teaching implemented by the Asst. Director for the Center during both a Preplanning session

- ❖ Offered special workshops in economics and geography for middle school teachers and help for our rural county teachers in NE Florida
- ❖ At all levels we continued to reinforce the Florida Sunshine Standards so important to classroom teachers at all grade levels and provide support for the various educational components found in Economic Education
- ❖ A new correlation of standards to the Atlanta Federal Reserve Bank, Jacksonville Branch educational materials was made by the Assistant Director for the Center through participation on the FRB Education Advisory Group in Jacksonville

A new class size amendment in the State of Florida reduced the number of countable students per teacher depending on academic level.

Maximums noted with approximation for numbers of students for each teacher –

Elementary (25-students); Middle School (100); High School (100) – Class sizes varied from 100 to 160 depending on the High School teacher.

The Center Assistant Director worked directly with over 1,180 teachers, pre-teachers, public, private and home schools along with parents serving approximately 114,625 students (1,135 secondary teachers, grades 6-12 and 45 elementary teachers, grades K-5) during the academic year 2005-2006.

We do believe that we did the best we could under the circumstances for which we had no control regarding any postponements and cancellations do uncertain weather conditions, i.e. hurricanes and hurricane warnings this past school year.
