Grades: Your grade for this course will be based entirely on homework, exams and the final exam, which will be given the following weights.

Homework	16%
Exam 1	28%
Exam 2	28%
Exam 3 (final)	28%

Letter grades will be assigned based on your weighted average according to the following scheme: 90 to 100 = A, 82 to 88 = B, 70 to 78 = C, 60 to 69 = D, and 0 to 59 = F. Averages which fall in between the intervals can go either way, with a plus or a minus, which will be determined based on the actual grade distribution for the class.

Homework: Homework will be assigned and collected daily (mostly likely beginning the second week of class). Homework is due at the beginning of class. Homework handed in late will be penalized 10 points for each day it is late. We will discuss select homework problem at the beginning of each class after it is handed in.

Exams: There will be three exams. Make-up exams will only be given in extreme circumstances and only with documentable evidence of circumstances beyond ones control. Exams will be given on the following days.

Attendance: Roll will not be taken. However, there is a strong positive correlation between attending class and student averages. Even if you get lost in lecture (this is normal), it's better than not being there at all. When you do come to class, be prepared to stay the whole class time. Leaving class early is a distraction to other students as well as your instructor.

Academic Integrity: The consequences of a breach of academic integrity, i.e. cheating, may result in receiving a grade of F for the course, which is non-forgivable, regardless of withdrawal status.
