UNF Poll: Deegan Frontrunner for Jacksonville Mayor

Jacksonville voters opposed to splitting stadium renovation cost

A new poll of likely voters in Duval County from the Public Opinion Research Lab (PORL) at the University of North Florida shows Democratic candidate Donna Deegan with an 18-point lead in the crowded field for Jacksonville Mayor.

Registered Duval County voters who are likely to vote in the March 21st election were asked their vote choices for several offices on the ballot, as well as additional questions about state and local issues.

When asked their vote choice for Jacksonville Mayor, Democrat Donna Deegan came out ahead of the other seven candidates, with 37% of respondents saying they would vote for her if the election were held today. Republican Daniel Davis came in second with 20%, followed by Republican Al Ferraro with 8% and Democrat Audrey Gibson with 7%. "Donna Deegan is the clear frontrunner in a crowded field, that looks poised to go until May," commented Dr. Michael Binder, PORL faculty director and UNF professor of political science. "That said, 31% of Republican and 24% of Independent voters are still undecided and that means it could still be anyone's race."

Donna Deegan came out ahead in all hypothetical head-to-head races against the top three Republican candidates. Davis fared the best in these matchups, with 48% of respondents indicating a vote for Deegan, 39% for Davis, and 14% who said they don't know or refused to answer. Deegan garnered 51% of the vote when stacked up against Ferraro, with 35%, and 14% who don't know or refused. Cumber came in with 30% against Deegan's 53%, with 18% who don't know or refused.

"Again, we're seeing between 12% and 20% of Republican voters still don't know who they'd pick, even when choosing between Deegan and the top three Republican candidates," noted Binder. "That big block of undecided voters makes this race particularly hard to predict, and they may ultimately decide which two candidates go on to the general election in May."

In addition to election questions, respondents were asked about other local issues, including the most important problem facing Jacksonville. Crime was the top choice among respondents with 37%, followed distantly by education, the economy, and housing costs, each with 12%. When asked their opinions about the City of Jacksonville removing all Confederate monuments from public spaces, 45% of respondents said they strongly or somewhat support removal, and 51% saying they oppose the removal, either strongly or somewhat.

"This issue continues to be a contentious one for Jacksonville voters, and you can really see where it splits when you break this down by race and ethnicity as well as party registration," commented Binder. "As you might expect, support for removing the monuments is higher among registered

Democrats and Black respondents, while Republicans and White respondents have greater opposition," he added.

Respondents were also asked their opinions on the prospect of Jacksonville hosting the 2028 Republican National Convention, for which it is being considered as a possible site. A majority (58%) of respondents said they support hosting the RNC, either strongly or somewhat, with 35% opposed.

"Unsurprisingly, support is higher among registered Republicans at 87%, but it is worth noting that 28% of registered Democrats are also on board," said Binder.

Job approvals for a number of local community leaders were also included in the survey, Jaguars quarterback Trevor Lawrence earning the highest approval rating of them all, with 86% of respondents saying they approve either strongly or somewhat. Head coach Doug Pederson and owner Shad Khan also fared well, with 84% and 71% approval, respectively. By contrast, 52% of respondents approve of the way Mayor Lenny Curry is handling his job, 45% approve of City Council, and 51% for Melissa Nelson, State Attorney for Florida's 4th Judicial Circuit.

"After a winning season, it's not entirely shocking to see such high approval for the Jaguars and it's clear that voters care quite a bit more for Trevor Lawrence and company than any of our elected officials," said Binder. "With the Mayor's office and City Council seats up for grabs next month, it will be interesting to see how the new administration, whomever it may be, handles potential stadium negotiations."

When asked how important it is for Jacksonville to have an NFL team, a majority of respondents (53%) said it was very important, with 31% saying it is somewhat important, and 14% not at all important. However, when asked whether they would support or oppose the city using up to \$750 million of public funds to split the cost of stadium renovations with the Jaguars, 61% said they oppose the expenditure, either strongly or somewhat. Finally, when asked whether they had shouted "DUUUVAL" in the past year, 48% said they had personally participated in the tradition.

"I think it's safe to say a lot of people like having an NFL team, and even approve of Shad Khan, but the voters we've talked to do *not* want to foot the bill for a new or improved stadium," commented Binder. "It's clearly not for lack of Duval pride, but most prefer to let the billionaire buy his own toys."

Methodology

The UNF PORL Jax Speaks Poll was conducted from February 20 through February 24, 2023, by the Public Opinion Research Lab (PORL) at the University of North Florida, and consists of a sample of 593 registered, likely voters in Duval County. A voter was considered "likely" if they voted in any of the following local elections: the 2019 Duval First Election, 2019 Duval General Election, 2021 Special First Unitary Election, or 2022 Special General Unitary Election. Respondents who indicated they would definitely not vote or probably not vote in the upcoming election were screened out of the survey, as well as those who said they don't know if they will vote or refused to answer. The sampling frames were sourced from the Florida voter file. To ensure a representative sample of likely voters, the samples was stratified into eight geographical regions based on House District.

Respondents were contacted by live callers via the telephone between 4:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, and 12:30 to 5:00 p.m. on the weekend, with up to three callbacks attempted. Data collection took place at the PORL facility with its 27-station Computer Assisted Telephone Interviewing (CATI) system. A single interviewer, through hand dialing, upon reaching an individual by phone, asked the listed respondent by name. If the respondent was not available, the call was terminated. This study had an 8% response rate, using the American Association of Public Opinion Research (AAPOR) Response Rate 3 (RR3) calculation.

All data were weighted by geographic strata, educational attainment, partisan registration, age, race, and sex to match the population of likely voters in Duval County. Partisan registration, House District, sex, race, and age weights were created from the January 2023 update of the Florida Voter File to match likely voters in each sample. Education weights were calculated using the Census Bureau's American Community Survey (ACS) 2021 5-year estimates for individuals 25 and over, adjusted for estimated likely voter effects. All weighted demographic variables were applied using the SPSS version 27 rake weighting function and are assigned a weight if one of the demographics being weighted on is missing. The margin of sampling error is +/- 4.0 percentage points.
