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**New UNF Poll: Most Duval Voters Opposed to Gas Tax Increase
But Approve of Septic Tank Phase-out Plan**

In a new poll of registered Jacksonville voters conducted by the Public Opinion Research Lab (PORL) at the University of North Florida, the majority of respondents oppose a recent bill increasing the Local Option Gas Tax from 6 cents to 12 cents. When asked whether they support or oppose the bill, which allocates the funds to road and transportation improvements, 58% of respondents said they either strongly or somewhat oppose it. However, when asked about reallocating funds freed up by the gas tax increase toward septic tank phase-out projects, an overwhelming 68% said they approved, either strongly or somewhat.

“This is a somewhat tricky situation,” said Dr. Michael Binder, PORL faculty director and associate professor of political science. “The bills are structured so that the septic tank plan depends on freed-up funds from the local option gas tax, but the data shows voters want the improvements *without* the additional gas tax.”

Respondents were also asked their opinions regarding an amendment to the original proposal to reallocate funds away from the JTA Skyway improvements, toward work on the Emerald Trail. The amendment would reallocate \$150 million originally earmarked for converting the Skyway for use with autonomous vehicles and divert it to improving the 30 miles of trails, greenways and parks connecting downtown and the surrounding neighborhoods. It would reduce the total amount going to the Skyway from \$379 million to \$229 million. When asked how much money should be spent on improving the Skyway, 34% said none, 21% said less than \$190 million, and 21% said \$229 million.

When asked a similar question about the Emerald Trail, 54% said *at least* \$150 million should be allocated to funding the trail, with 23% indicating even more should be spent. Twenty-six percent said it should be less than \$150 million, while another 20% indicated no money at all should be allocated to the trail.

“An enormous majority, 87%, think that less money should be allocated to the Skyway than the original proposal, many of whom think the number should be zero,” said Binder. “The Emerald Trail fared somewhat better, but voters aren’t terribly excited about spending money on either project.”

In addition to the bills, respondents were asked about their opinions about the City of Jacksonville removing confederate statues from public spaces, to which 51% of respondents said they either strongly or somewhat support it, and 49% said they strongly or somewhat oppose it. Support for removing the statues has decreased somewhat since the June 2020 JaxSpeaks Poll, which showed 65% of Jacksonville voters supported removal either strongly or somewhat.

When asked about renaming Duval County Public Schools currently named after confederate soldiers, 52% said they support it, while 48% said they oppose either somewhat or strongly. The racial breakdown of responses is similar to that of the confederate statues.

Respondents were also asked their approval of several federal, state, and local officials, beginning with President Joe Biden. In the overall sample, 49% said they approve either strongly or somewhat, with 46% disapproving, and 5% indicating they did not know. Among Democrats, 61% said they strongly approve, while 78% of Republicans say they strongly disapprove.

Governor Ron DeSantis fared slightly better than Biden, with 50% approval in the overall sample, 46% disapproval, and 4% saying they did not know. Unsurprisingly, 68% of Democrats strongly disapprove of Governor DeSantis, while 76% of Republicans strongly approve. Agricultural Commissioner Nikki Fried garnered 37% approval, 17% disapproval, and a whopping 46% who do not know.

Mayor Lenny Curry had 48% job approval from Duval voters, up from 42% in December of 2020. Forty-three percent said they disapprove, while 9% said they did not know. Approval of Sheriff Mike Williams was slightly higher at 50%, with 30% disapproving and 20% indicating they do not know. Jacksonville City Council had 34% approval, and a similarly high percentage of those who don't know, at 23%. Melissa Nelson came in at 38% approval and 18% disapproval, with 43% not knowing.

With a few candidates having announced running for Mayor in the Spring of 2023, respondents were asked who they would vote for, if the election were today. Potential candidates were included on the list of responses if they have publicly announced running, expressed interest in running, or have otherwise been publicly discussed as possibly running in the 2023 Mayoral election. The candidate with the greatest support was Donna Deegan (D) with 19%, followed closely by Matt Carlucci (R) with 18%. Twenty percent said they would vote for someone else not on the list, while 13% said they did not know. For the full list of answer choices, please see the Crosstabs section of this release.

“Although it’s still very far out from the election, it is interesting to see a relatively even split between Democrat Donna Deegan and Republican Matt Carlucci,” Binder commented. “It will be even more interesting to see how these numbers change over the next two years, as more candidates throw their hats into the ring.”

Finally, respondents were asked about the job approval of Shad Khan, Urban Meyer and Trevor Lawrence. Coming off the heels of a perceived successful draft, Shad Khan’s job approval as owner of the Jaguars came in 49% approval to only 28% disapproval. Urban Meyer, having not coached a game yet, has approval at 45% with only 13% disapproval. Trevor Lawrence’s job approval as a quarterback for the Jaguars was 45% with only 7% disapproval.

“It makes a ton of sense that the ‘don’t know’ responses were so high for Urban Meyer (42%) and Trevor Lawrence (48%) since they haven’t coached or played in an NFL game yet, but the city is excited about having them in town and hopeful they’ll be successful,” said Binder.

Methodology

The Jax Speaks May poll was conducted and sponsored by the Public Opinion Research Lab at the University of North Florida from May 11, 2021 through May 16, 2021. The survey was administered via email through Qualtrics, an online survey platform. The sample frame was comprised of 1,263 registered voters in Duval County, 18 years of age or older. The email addresses used for this survey were sourced from the Florida's Division of Elections January 2021 update and selected through the use of probability sampling among registered voters in the Florida voter file.

The margin of sampling error for this survey is +/- 2.8 percentage points. Data were weighted by partisan registration, age, race, sex, education, 2020 vote choice and city council district. Education weights were created from the Census's 2019 American Community Survey (ACS) estimate for the percent of college-educated individuals in Duval County. Vote choice from 2020 was weighted to the Duval County election results from November. Partisan registration, sex, race, geographic and age weights were created from the January update of the Florida voter file to match the registered voters in Duval County.

There were no statistical adjustments made due to design effects. This study had a 2.7% response rate. This survey was directed by Dr. Michael Binder, UNF associate professor of political science.
