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New UNF Poll Reveals Incredibly High Gubernatorial Ratings for DeSantis Majority Support Legalization of Recreational Marijuana

The Public Opinion Research Lab (PORL) at the University of North Florida has a new poll of Florida registered voters that shows a large majority approve of Governor Ron DeSantis. The survey also shows a majority support the legalization of recreational marijuana. The poll, comprised of registered voters in the state of Florida, shows 72% strongly or somewhat approve of the job DeSantis is doing as governor, with only 17% disapproving. Job approval is highest among Republicans at 91%, with 56% of Democrats approving as well. Overall, 11% didn't know.

"This is the highest gubernatorial approval in recent history. You'd have to go back to the early days of the Charlie Christ administration to see numbers this high," said Dr. Michael Binder, faculty director of the Public Opinion Research Lab at UNF. "Working on bipartisan issues and acting in a reasonable fashion during the recent hurricane season are contributing to his popularity in a state where the governor isn't historically popular across parties."

When asked about job approval for Florida's two senators, 48% approve of the job Marco Rubio is doing as senator and 49% approve of the job Rick Scott is doing. Rubio's disapproval is at 34%, making his approval net positive at 14, while Scott's disapproval is at 32%, giving him a net positive approval at 17. Unsurprisingly, Republicans are more likely to approve of Rubio and Scott at 76% and 77%, respectively. Only 26% of Democrats approve of Rubio, 28% approve of Scott, 18% indicated they don't know how they feel about Rubio's job approval and 19% don't know about Scott's. Nikki Fried's job approval is at 41%, with disapproval at 10%. However, 49% don't know how she's doing as Florida Commissioner of Agriculture. Democrats and Republicans approve of Fried at similar rates, with 41% and 44% approving, respectively.

"Rubio's approval levels are comparable to previous polls," Binder said. "But the real surprise findings are Fried's bipartisan approval; both Democrats and Republicans are approving of her in similar numbers."

In light of Florida's upcoming legislative session, respondents were asked whether they support or oppose select policy changes. Regarding recreational marijuana, 64% support legalization, while 33% oppose. The numbers are higher for Democrats, as 73% support the legalization of recreational marijuana, but 54% of Republicans support this change as well.

"Though it's very unlikely a Republican legislature will legalize recreational marijuana this session, it's fascinating that even a majority of Republicans support legalization," Binder noted.

There is strong support for requiring businesses to use a federal immigration database (E-Verify) to check workers' eligibility, with 71% supporting and 23% opposing. Among Democrats, 63% support the use of E-Verify, with 81% of Republicans supporting. Separately, 38% of respondents support allowing undocumented immigrants to obtain driver's licenses, while 59% oppose. When broken out by party, 61% of Democrats support the policy, while only 12% of Republicans support it.

"The bipartisan support for E-Verify could buoy this issue during session, but business interests are often opposed to state level action on immigration verification systems," Binder noted. "Republican opposition to allowing undocumented immigrants to obtain drivers licenses suggests this issue probably won't get addressed this session."

Respondents were also asked about Governor DeSantis' recent addition to Amendment Four, a ballot measure passed in 2018. When asked whether they support or oppose his additional requirement for felons to pay court-ordered fines, fees and restitution before being added back into the voting pool, 55% support his addition, with 32% opposing it. Among Democrats, 41% support the additional requirement and 74% of Republicans support it. To follow up, respondents were asked how they viewed the addition to the original ballot measure, 39% said they viewed the change as a necessary addition to an unclear ballot measure, while 35% said it's an unconstitutional addition that undermines voting rights and 25% didn't know how to view the change. Republicans were more likely to view the change as a necessary clarification at 57%, while Democrats said it's an unconstitutional addition at 54%. Along a similar vein, 47% of respondents said they personally know a convicted felon, while 51% said they don't.

"Amendment Four and the legislation passed earlier this year are currently in the courts, but a preliminary injunction issued recently suggests that SB 7066 might get revisited this session," said Binder.

Methodology

The UNF Florida statewide poll was conducted and sponsored by the Public Opinion Research Lab at the University of North Florida, from Monday, Oct. 14, 2019, through Sunday, Oct. 20, 2019, by live callers via the telephone from 5 to 9 p.m. during the week and noon to 9 p.m. on the weekends with a maximum of five callbacks attempted. UNF undergraduate students and employees conducted interviews in English and Spanish. Data collection took place at the PORL facility with its 27-station Computer Assisted Telephone Interviewing (CATI) system. The phone numbers used for this survey were sourced from the Tuesday, Sept. 10, 2019, update of the Florida Voter File. The sample frame was comprised of registered Florida voters. Overall, there were 669 completed surveys of Florida registered voters, 18 years of age or older.

The margin of sampling error for the total sample is +/- 3.8 percentage points. The breakdown of completed responses on a landline phone to a cell phone was 23% to 77%, with less than 1% unidentified. Through hand dialing, an interviewer upon reaching the individual as specified in the voter file asked that respondent to participate, regardless of landline telephone or cell phone. Data were then weighted by partisan registration, age, race, sex and education. Education weights were created from the 2017 American Community Survey (ACS). Partisan registration, sex, race and age weights were created from the Tuesday, Sept. 10, 2019, update of the Florida Voter File to match the active registered voters in Florida. These demographic characteristics were pulled from the voter file list.

All weighted demographic variables were applied using the SPSS version 25 rake weighting function, which won't assign a weight if one of the demographics being weighted on is missing. In this case, respondents missing a response for education were given a weight of 1. There were no statistical adjustments made due to design effects. This study had a 27.5% response rate. The American Association of Public Opinion Research (AAPOR) Response Rate 3 (RR3) calculation was used which consists of an estimate of what proportion of cases of unknown eligibility are truly eligible. This survey was sponsored by the UNF PORL and directed by Dr. Michael Binder, UNF associate professor of political science.

The PORL is a full-service survey research facility that provides tailored research to fulfill each client's individual needs from political, economic, social and cultural projects. The PORL opened in 2001 and is an independent, non-partisan center, a charter member of the American Association for Public Opinion Research Transparency Initiative and a member of the Association of Academic Survey Research Organization.
