



HOUSING CONDUCT PROCESS

Overall, the housing conduct process is designed to be supportive, providing students with clear pathways to resolution while emphasizing accountability and personal growth. Engaging with the process positively can lead to beneficial outcomes and lessons learned for future situations.

Understanding your rights and responsibilities is crucial for a smooth resolution and personal growth.

Students Attending Initial Meetings

Attending initial meetings allows students to be well informed about their case and also give their input.

Student Rights

Students have the right to ask questions, the right to have an advisor present during the hearing, the right to confidentiality/FERPA and the right to appeal the decision.

Students Completing Requirements Successfully

Completing requirements such as educational sanctions is essential for closing the case and avoiding escalation.

Educational Sanction Examples

Roommate Agreement Review/Revision

Allows students to come together to review and revisit their initial roommate agreement. Students will identify areas within the agreement that may need clarification or adjustment and work collaboratively to develop compromises and solutions that are acceptable to all parties.

Fire Safety Paper

Students will complete a fire safety reflection paper that reviews fire prevention practices, common safety hazards, and proper emergency response procedures. This assignment is intended to strengthen residents' understanding of their role in maintaining a safe living environment.

Brochure Creation

Students will create an educational brochure that provides information related to their case, highlighting key points, and outlines recommended practices or resources. This assignment is intended to support learning, reflection, and increased understanding of the identified situation.

FERPA (Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act) is a federal law that protects the privacy of your educational records. This means your academic, housing, and conduct information generally cannot be shared without your permission, except in certain situations permitted by law.
