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UNF Poll Reveals Opposition to the Republican National Convention in Jacksonville

Duval Voters Feel Increased Concern Over COVID-19 pandemic

The Public Opinion Research Lab (PORL) at the University of North Florida released a new poll comprised of registered Duval County voters showing opposition to the Republican National Convention (RNC) coming to Jacksonville, as well as increased levels of concern over coronavirus (COVID-19) and its effects.

In light of the RNC coming to Jacksonville, respondents were asked whether they approve or disapprove of the decision. Among respondents, 58%, strongly or somewhat oppose Jacksonville hosting the RNC, with 42% supporting it. When asked how concerned they were about COVID-19 transmission if a large number gathered for the RNC in Jacksonville, 71% were very or somewhat concerned. Similarly, 61% were very or somewhat concerned about protests and social unrest during the RNC in Jacksonville. In terms of economic impact, 66% agree that the RNC could generate up to 100 million dollars for Jacksonville's economy. However, 56% of respondents disagree that the RNC will bring positive media attention to Jacksonville.

"National nominating conventions are polarizing events, and unsurprisingly the levels of support for Jacksonville hosting the RNC varies dramatically by partisanship," Dr. Michael Binder stated, director of the Public Opinion Research Lab. "Under the backdrop of a global pandemic that appears to have come more fervently to Florida, the opposition to this event being hosted locally seems much more concerning.

Voters were also asked about their general level of concern regarding the COVID-19 pandemic and its effects. A vast majority of respondents, 79%, indicated they are somewhat or very concerned about the pandemic in general, while 67% said they are very or somewhat concerned about contracting the virus themselves. Since the previous COVID-19 survey PORL conducted in April, overall concern about the virus has decreased by 14%, and concern over personally contracting the virus decreased by 15%. When asked about the long-term impact of COVID-19 on the economy and on personal finances, concern is higher for the economy (85%) than on personal finances (65%). When asked whether the public health impact or the economic impact of COVID-19 is a bigger concern, 60% indicated that public health impact is the greater concern, compared to 40% stated economic impact was more concerning. Respondents who personally know someone who has tested positive for COVID-19 has increased from 21% in April to 35% in June. Of those who now know someone, 70% indicated that they tested positive in Florida. When asked about the stay at home order and social distancing restrictions, the majority of respondents believe that Jacksonville is moving too quickly in easing restrictions and reopening businesses, at 56%.

“Even though levels of concern have abated somewhat since our last poll in April, COVID-19 worries remain extremely high in Jacksonville,” Binder noted. “More people know somebody that has contracted the virus and the economy is not turning around as quickly as people might have hoped two months ago.”

For job approval, President Donald Trump garnered 39% approval, with 61% disapproving. Governor Ron DeSantis’ approval rating is at 48% approval and a 50% disapproval, while Agricultural Commissioner Nikki Fried had 36% approval, with only 15% disapproving, but 48% didn’t know. Locally, Mayor Lenny Curry has a net negative job approval with 45% approval and 49% disapproval. The Jacksonville City Council is faring only slightly better with just 40% approval and 38% disapproval. Mike Williams has 44% approval and 37% disapproval, with 19% don’t know. Diana Greene, the DCPS Superintendent, garnered 49% approval and only 19% disapproval with 32% don’t know.

“Curry’s positive job approval numbers are very similar to the survey from June of last year, but his disapproval numbers have jumped markedly,” commented Dr. Binder, “JEA, COVID-19 and the unpopular decision to host the Republican National Convention have increased his disapproval levels.”

The survey also measured respondents’ opinions on local issues relevant to Jacksonville. When asked about whether they would be for or against a half-cent sales tax increase to support schools, 70% were for the tax, with 30% against. Regarding the removal of Confederate statues from public spaces, 65% of respondents strongly or somewhat support the measure, while 36% strongly or somewhat oppose. Respondents were asked about their familiarity with Ax Handle Saturday, a racially motivated attack that took place in Jacksonville in August of 1960. In response, 46% reported being very or somewhat familiar, while 42% said they were not familiar at all.

“The ½ cent sales surtax for local schools is receiving a tremendous amount of support,” Binder said. “It also bodes well for the prospect of passing that the support levels for registered voters is nearly identical to the likely voter estimates.”

For the first time since 2015, crime is no longer the most important issue to registered voters in Jacksonville. COVID-19 now tops the list with 22% of respondents indicating it is the most important problem facing Jacksonville today, followed closely by crime at 19%, and race relations at 16%.

“Obviously as the global pandemic drags on, and Jacksonville is beginning to get national attention due to increases in positive tests, voters are rightly concerned,” added Binder.

Respondents were also asked about the recent demonstrations and protests in Jacksonville following the death of George Floyd. Less than a quarter of respondents have participated either in person or by donating money, only 23%. However, support for non-violent protests and demonstrations in Jacksonville is high, with 82% strongly or somewhat supporting. That support drops dramatically when asked about violent protests in Jacksonville, with just 17% supporting. When asked if they thought the police in Jacksonville could be trusted to do the right thing, only 8% said all of the time, with 46% saying most of the time, 29% saying only some of the time, and 17% not very often at all. Overall, 36% of respondents agreed that black and white people receive equal treatment from police in Jacksonville, with many more disagreeing at 64%. A majority of respondents (59%) think that the deaths of black people

during encounters with police in Jacksonville are signs of a broader problem of systemic racism, as opposed to isolated incidents (41%).

“Jacksonville is not immune to the wave of national attention focused on racial inequality, and overwhelming majorities locally are supportive of the movement to alleviate these disparities,” Binder said. “No person or public agency is perfect; however, it is worrisome that such a relatively large segment of the population does not trust the police to do the right thing more often than not.”

Regarding the upcoming 2020 general election, 48% indicated a vote for Joe Biden, while 41% stated they would for Donald Trump. Just 5% said they wouldn't vote.

“As always, the disclaimer with these numbers is that they present the findings of likely voters five months before an election. Additionally, the campaign season has waned dramatically in a time when it would normally be kicked into overdrive,” Binder warns. “However, when thinking about Duval in particular, it is important to understand Jacksonville in 2020 has a +6 Democratic registration advantage over Republicans – yet in 2016 that margin was only +3. We are a changing city and the current times seem to be accelerating that change.”

Methodology

The UNF Jacksonville Speaks Poll was conducted and sponsored by the Public Opinion Research Lab at the University of North Florida from Wednesday, June 17 through Monday, June 22, 2020. The survey was administered through email via Qualtrics, an online survey platform. The sample frame was comprised of 2,524 registered Duval County voters, 18 years of age or older. The email addresses used for this survey were sourced from the Florida's Division of Elections February update and selected through the use of probability sampling among Duval County registered voters in the Florida voter file.

The margin of sampling error for the total sample is +/-1.95 percentage points. Data were weighted by partisan registration, age, race, sex, education, and geography. Education weights were created from the Census' 2018 American Community Survey (ACS) estimate for the percent of college-educated individuals in the state of Florida, approximately 30%. Partisan registration, sex, race, and age weights were created from the February update of the Florida voter file to match the active registered voters in Duval County, Florida. These demographic characteristics were pulled from the voter file list.

All weighted demographic variables were applied using the SPSS version 26 rake weighting function, which won't assign a weight if one of the demographics being weighted is missing. Individuals without a weight were manually given a weight of 1. There were no statistical adjustments made due to design effects. This study had a 4.5% response rate. This survey was directed by Dr. Michael Binder, UNF associate professor of political science.

The PORL is a full-service survey research facility that provides tailored research to fulfill each client's individual needs from political economic, social, and cultural projects.
